#### But why convergence?

- Opportunistic engagement
- Response to changing conditions/law enforcement
- Diversification strategy
- Transactionally: commodity exchange with other groups





## CRIME CONVERGENCE: WHY? (2)

#### WHY do we care?

- We are in the business of disrupting and dismantling organized criminal groups.
- Improved understanding of commonalities/intersections  $\rightarrow$  strategic policy and law enforcement interventions













## CRIME CONVER ENCE: WHAT?

#### Commodities

- wildlife: e.g. ivory and pangolin scales, rhino horn and abalone
- wildlife + other: e.g. shark fins and drugs
- Modus operandi
  - Shared intermediaries/ facilitators (i.e. banks, lawyers, smugglers etc.)
  - Use of the same hubs/ports
  - Use of same transport (i.e. flight operators, couriers)
- Other transnational criminal activities
  - Money laundering & financial crime
  - Corruption
- Linkages between wildlife crime and armed groups/security concerns












## WIRE - WILDLIFE INTER-REGIONAL ENFORCEMENT



#### **WIRE POLICE**

- Targeting investigators from police or wildlife agencies
- Provide a platform for the exchange of information on trends, patterns, existing transnational cases, etc.



#### WIRE PROSECUTORS

- Targeting prosecutors from environmental or central authorities
- Map obstacles to international cooperation and identify solutions for legal support on TOC cases



#### WIRE CUSTOMS

- Targeting customs from CITES teams, risk profiling units, Port Control Units
- Identify risk indicator to improve the profiling

Build bridges between direct counterparts in Asia and Africa (soon LAC!)

Dec 2021: 5<sup>th</sup> WIRE (virtual) meeting

250 law enforcement and criminal justice representatives from 34 countries.

UNODC coordinated 12 bilateral meetings to support furthering joint investigations and operations.
